



Jon Brooks was born in Manchester, New Hampshire in 1944. As a child he attended the Currier Museum Art Center and later the School of the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston. For the last several decades he has been a leading figure among American studio furniture makers. Throughout his career he has used natural materials to explore the boundaries between art and craft and he has been recognized internationally for his innovation, creativity and technical skill.

- Collage papers such as construction paper, wrapping paper, or colorful junk mail


Tips:
